Undersea & Hyperbaric Medical Society

Jeannine attended the Divers Day at the Northeast Chapters Annual Meeting that was held on Oct 24 at the Boston Marriott Quincy.

She attended Sealab lecture presented by Ben Hellwarth. And she also bought the book! SEALAB: America's Forgotten Quest to Live and Work on the Ocean Floor

At the time that Sealab was being kicked around as an idea, there were not many mentions in the National Geographic or in the newspapers. The nation's focus was on other things such as the space race. One person who was curious was Cousteau. Cousteau met with Captain/Dr George Bond (head of the navy) about more of this. Bond knows that where Cousteau goes, a lot of publicity will follow. Bond does convince the Navy to take this experiment out to sea in 1964. Not a lot of funds were set aside and Sealab was built with some recyclable parts. What they lacked In funds, they made up in camaraderie. It was a relaxed and not very formal project. This first lab was positioned off of Cuba in warm clear water.

In July, the first team went into the lab and the audiotapes show the effects of helium (helium replaced nitrogen in the air mix to mitigate the effects of nitrogen narcosis at the depths they were "diving.") Sometimes the effects of helium on the voice interfered with communications and they resorted to writing messages to each other.

In 1965, Sealab II was launched and was more refined, robust and was settled off the coast of Southern California in 40 degree water.

Before Sealab, the Navy started in the 1960's with experimenting with animals such as goats. Bob Barth was first first navy diver that volunteered to the tests. Bob also was part of all three Sealabs. He's still alive, well and kicking today.

Scott Carpenter was an astronaut that circled the earth. He turned aquanaut and was very interested in the work being done at Sealab. He was the team leader for the expeditions. He played the guitar in the lab, complete with serenading the other divers in his Mickey Mouse voice! On of the dangers of their Aqua experiments was getting lost. They trained a dolphin to come at the call of a buzzer, the diver would hook on to a harness which was strapped onto the dolphin, and the dolphin would swim them back to Sealab.

Sealab III launched in 1969 off the coast of CA to a depth of 600' with five teams of ~8 divers. Bob Barth is the first man into the new lab. On the maiden dive, everything that could go wrong, did go wrong.

After Sealab III, the navy focused their underwater efforts on espionage.

She also attended Alex Post's presentation on the Prevention and Mitigation of the Dangers of Spearfishing.
