January Dives

January diving is a touch and go proposition week in, week out, due to the unpredictability of the weather and water. January 2017 proved no different than years gone by, whether in New England or Ohio. Looking at my log indicates in addition to the New Year's Day Sober Up dive, I made three additional forays into the the underwater realm. One was at Ft. Weatherill on January 22, with former Neptune Mike Vaughan and Bonnie Zeller, and the second one took place at Plymouth Beach on January 28 with Brian Smith, a dive buddy of mine who dives out of Divers Market in Plymouth. He and I also dove Morton's Pond earlier in the month. All three dives were marked by sunny days and relatively warm surface conditions of about 40°-45°F and underwater conditions ranging from 36-38°F, depending upon the location. Dive times were 30 minutes and 20 minutes, respectively, with depths ranging from 28-30' at the fort to @ 15' at Plymouth and the pond. Vis at Ft. Weatherill was a murky 5' - 7'. Bonnie found a star fish and Mike and I saw a few small animals. While at Plymouth Brian and I enjoyed 7 - 10' and found a dish, moon snail egg case, and a few other tiny critters. The pond dive was unremarkable.



Due to the very bulky dry gloves I wear with my dry suit, it is virtually impossible to take photos, so this lone surface shot taken by a stranger of Mike (l), Bonnie (c), and me (r) will have to do to record our Rhode Island dive. Although a bit nippy and less than ideal, it still feels good to get wet as the conditions allow. Now, it is time to sit back and enjoy the Super Bowl and hope the outcome reflects the game's special name, which I am certain everyone will agree, IT DID!!!!

Oldest shipwreck in Central Mediterranean reveals clues about Phoenician trade networks
A shipwreck found a decade ago is still yielding new clues regarding the Phoenician civilisation (*sic*).

Divers have plunged 110 metres deep in the Mediterranean Sea to recover artefacts from a 2,700 year old shipwreck. One of their discoveries, an amphora from Malta, suggests the Maltese islands were an integral part of the Phoenician trade route in the Mediterranean.

The shipwreck was first found in 2007 off the coasts of Gozo, an island in the Maltese archipelago. It dates back to the first part of the 7th century BC, which makes it is oldest wreck ever found in the central Mediterranean to date. Between 2007 and 2009, archaeologists surveyed the site but limited equipment meant they weren't able to recover any objects.

In 2014, the team led by Dr Timmy Gambin from the University of Malta, along with colleagues from the University of Aix-Marseille, France, received funding from the French National Research Agency. This allowed them to record the site using very high-resolution imagery and to unearth four artefacts – two amphorae, an urn and a grinding stone. However, the expedition was cut short by bad weather so they were not able to map the site as it was when they left it, and to recover all the objects they wanted.

Detroit River's muddy bottom conceals cannons, cars, guns

Below the murky, rolling currents of the Detroit River is a floor loaded with centuries of artifacts: war cannons, old wooden ships, cars and hundreds of firearms, ranging from wooden muskets to automatic handguns.



Visibility is so poor that scuba divers make many of these discoveries by running their hands along the river bottom. City ordinance forbids the public from diving in the river within Detroit city limits — partly because of safety concerns, and partly because there's so much criminal evidence down there, said Sgt. Dean Rademaker with the Detroit Police Underwater Recovery Team.

"For as long as this city has been around, people have been throwing stuff into the water," he said. Detroit was founded in 1701.

Police have recovered hundreds of guns, including 11 at one time in the span of one archway of the MacArthur bridge connecting Belle Isle to the mainland. In the police dive team headquarters, there's a mounted M1 Carbine rifle from sometime between World War II to the 1960s. On the same wall, there's a propeller from a sunken Prohibition-era rum runner found near the bridge.

Numerous cars, including a DeLorean in the 1980s, and more recently, a Jeep Cherokee and Nissan Xterra, have been removed from the water. In 2009, a police diver was searching near a Jeep, in the water not far from Alter Road on Detroit's east side, when he found a bronze statue stolen from the Grosse Pointe War Memorial. Rademaker said that if the river were ever somehow dammed above Detroit, "people would be just amazed" at the things that appear.
