# **September-October Activities and Dives**

#### Oct. 5: Old Garden

Mike Vaughan and I met in front of Macy's at South Shore Plaza and headed north to Rockport's Old Garden Beach for a late morning, early PM plunge in the briny North Atlantic. Pebble Beach was awash in seaweed with zero vis from the storm earlier in the week. Because it was a week day, we were able to park right in front of the park and suit up.



Our 69-minute dive was relaxing. There were only a few other divers anywhere to be seen and not in our way at all. I was trying out my new Sea Llfe DC2000 without the flash and came

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up with some interesting photos. This camera's resolution is far superior to the old 1400 and has a much much faster trigger. Mike found a few keepers and I a flounder. We saw some baby lobsters, a number of eggers, interesting crabs, breadcrumb sponges, a juvenile Sea Raven (Below),



and surprise of surprises, an electric torpedo ray (Above right), the likes of which I personally haven't seen since the late 70s. Vis ranged from 10 - 20 feet or more, depending on the depth and part of the cove we happened to be in. Our max depth was 41', H<sub>2</sub>O was @ 62°. It was a great day to dive.

### Oct 1: Sunday's Dive

Now that the storms have passed, I decided to launch the boat and get a few more days of boat diving this season. Since Quincy Yacht Club has removed the floats from the water, I met Todd, Ken and Jon at the Quincy public ramp and launched the boat. We loaded up the boat and headed out.

The weather forecast called for 5 to 10 mph wind with 2 ft. waves. I figured we could get at least one dive in before the weather got too rough. Heading out the channel, I could see white caps in the West Gut, but I was still optimistic (the power of positive thinking). After Hull Gut, the waves picked up and as we passed Boston Light, I had to close the window to keep water from splashing into the boat. as we reached Shag Rocks, we started to encounter rollers coming in from the east and white caps coming from the west.

Then, I heard in unison from my mutinous crew, "Who's bright Idea was this!"

We thought about where we could tuck in to dive and decided to hide behind Great Brewster Island. We anchored in 30ft of water and only had to deal with the rollers coming from the east, which was not too bad.

Our first dive was not too bad, either. Vis was about 10 to 15 ft. at the bottom. I caught 4 keepers and saw many 2 lb. eggers. Todd got 1 and Ken grabbed 2.

For our second dive Ken and I decided to swim to the rock outcropping behind the boat and look there for lobsters. So off we went. After only finding only 1 lobster and a huge ball of tangled lobster traps, I decided to check to see where the boat was. Well, I guess I was riding the outgoing tide and discovered I was almost at the end of Great Brewster Island, well beyond the rock outcropping. I took a heading for the boat and started a long swim against the outgoing tide back to the boat, On our way back in, to our surprise the seas had flattened out. In all we caught 10 lobsters. Since my thermometer has been reading 106 degrees for the past few years, I don't know what the exact water temp was, I just knew it was warmer in the water that on the boat. On the way back in, we passed a very large grey seal at Hull Gut. I turned around to take some pictures, but he disappeared underwater. We waited for about 5 to 10 minutes for him to resurface but he never did. When We returned to the Quincy Yacht Club, we sat down and watched some of the football game (Ed.: and probably enjoyed a pop or two or three).


