Crossroads of Commerce: Shipwrecks of the Great Lakes by Monty Fitzpatrick

A narration and video presentation shot during a technical dive trip to the Mackinac Straits and Michigan's Upper Peninsula areas. The video features the history and current condition of the brig Sandusky (Lake Michigan), the steamship Vienna (Lake Superior), and the bulk carrier Cedarville (Lake Huron).

Dive Report: Bonaire, Dutch Caribbean (3 dive days, 8 dives total)

Early in the year most years, my wife and I plan a trip to a warm destination. By late January, the cold wears thin, and, I especially, am looking for a break. I had heard about Bonaire from the diving community, both through the Neptunes, and through the dive shops I have used in Massachusetts (East Coast Divers in Brookline, and AST Scuba in Pittsfield).

This year, my pick was to spend four and a half days in Bonaire. The Neptunes are quite familiar with the place, and I am thankful for the suggestion of the Plaza Resort and Toucan Diving. I liked that everything was available on the same campus, and that there were boat dives easily available from there. I was traveling by myself, so I didn't have a reliable dive buddy for shore dives.







The Plaza itself was fine, as nice as I expected. The food was decent, and my room was huge for just one person! I think I caught the resort in the middle of renovations; there is a huge building under construction along the main road, part of which is the new restaurant that just opened in December. There appears to be a new main lobby and guest rooms coming, as well, but they are still a construction site.

I planned three dive days, filling them up with as many boat dives as I could do, leaving the appropriate surface interval for my flight home. I normally fly with United, and went down through Newark (fastest way), and returned via Houston (about 4.5 hours longer).

Most of the boat dive sites were located around Klein Bonaire, the small island on the West side of the larger island. On the last day, the boat did go to sites near the Salt Pier, and the Hilma Hooker shipwreck, (although the wreck was 50 feet below us). The visibility was excellent at over 50 feet.

The sea life was very active at the dive sites, with parrotfish, filefish, and barracuda swimming around. I even came within a few feet of a Moray Eel – on one dive, the dive master pointed to something in a nearby outcrop of coral; I swam over to see what it was, and when I saw the eel, I quickly reversed course.

The water temperature was steady at 79-80 deg F. The air temperature was 85 deg F every day, but Bonaire has a constant 10-20 mph wind, and that makes a boat dive much cooler than diving from the shore. I found that after a 50–60-minute dive, I couldn't stay warm on the dive, or on the boat for the surface interval, or the ride back to port with the 3mm wetsuit from the rental shop. Luckily, I brought my 7mm wetsuit with me, and I used it on five of my dives, with no problems! I had to be firm with the Toucan Diving staff to give me the weight I needed for the 7mm. They claimed that "no one needs a 7mm", but I did overhear two different dive masters complain how cold they were on these same dives, so I am confident I made the right choice for my comfort and safety.

I captured the highlights of my dive experience with my GoPro, creating a 5 min video showing the highlights – 2:30 shows the Hilma Hooker shipwreck (at a distance), and 2:40 shows the Salt Pier.



Ragnar Road New England Race - May 17-18

Most people are familiar with Ragnar but for those that are unfamiliar with Ragnar it is a company that plans and hosts relay races around the country. They have a big operation that requires countless volunteers and staff to complete the races. Fortunately for the club there is **financial compensation for volunteering** so the club has been able to use this race as a **major fundraising event**.

The Ragnar Road New England race is attended yearly by of over one hundred teams of 12 (or less) that start in the town of Groton, CT and end in Quincy, Ma. The Race is 200-ish miles long and makes its way through three states (CT, RI, and MA), again, relay-style.

The Neptune's last year were able to volunteer at 3 exchanges and the finish line raising just under \$3000 at these sites alone. I hope we can at least do that again this year. We will be volunteering at exchanges (relay points) on May 18th. Our earliest exchange begins at 5:30 AM. This is a 10-to-12-hour commitment per the race schedule but often times is closer to 8 hours. That being said, this is still a fun day to be hanging out with fellow Neptune's and earning some money for the club. It should also be noted that money earned participating in this event will help to keep the costs of other club events down.

Group Engagement: Ragnar will add \$50 to your donation for group engagement: Dress up! Decorate your Exchange! Engage with the runners through music or other fun ways. These are ways to earn additional donations for your groups.

Fundraisers: Ragnar will add \$100 to your donation for group fundraisers. Your group keeps 100% of sales! If your group hosts a food fundraiser (must register your fundraiser prior to the event). The \$100 to your group is to supplement costs and show our appreciation for your efforts for our runners. Organizing a fundraiser is a huge opportunity to support your group and we are here to offer tips and suggestions to make it as successful as possible. Goodies, warm and cold food and beverages depending on the weather/time of day.

Recreational Lobster Regulation Update \text{\textit{\text{\text{\text{P}}}}



It has come to the attention of the Bay State Council that Massachusetts is proposing to change Recreational Lobster regulations.

Proposed changes will affect commercial and recreational harvest requirements.

New regulations would increase the minimum size requirements with two increases over the next 5 years, and there will be a Maximum size cape of 6-3/4" for the outer cape region.

Divers that hunt lobster in our coastal communities should be made aware of these possible changes in our near future.


The first change will implement an increase in the minimum allowable catch size from 3-1/4" to 3-5/16" starting on January 01, 2025.

Then an additional increase from 3-5/16" to 3-3/8" on January 01, 2027.

The Bay State Council has no opinion on this matter as this does not affect ocean access for divers and falls outside of our charter.
